This course is designed to help educators identify those students who may be at risk for certain harmful behaviors. Topics discussed include warning signs of suicide and the effects of suicide on the family and friends that are left behind. Also included will be discussions on drugs – the blatant abuse of prescription drugs, OTC drugs and illegal drugs. The harmful effects on the body physically, socially and emotionally will be evaluated. The problems of using alcohol and the effects it has on the young persons body. Zero tolerance laws and DWI laws will also be addressed. Once warning signs are discussed several preventative and intervention strategies will be detailed as well.

Participants will: Evaluate poor lifestyle choices and their effects on a persons health; Identify warning signs of suicide, drug and alcohol abuse; Learn coping strategies for those left behind after a suicide; Develop a working knowledge of what is appropriate to say to a person struggling with suicide and/or drugs and alcohol; Demonstrate an understanding for those at risk for suicide, alcohol and drug abuse; Evaluate intervention methods for suicide, drug and alcohol use an abuse; Develop communication skills to be used during an intervention. This course is designed to provide educators with information, strategies and resources on the important components of a "growth mindset learning environment" (Dweck, 2015) within their classrooms.

# ED 5990 G858 Helping Children Cope With Trauma, Loss and Death

Traumatic experiences can have a devastating impact on a child, altering their physical, emotional, cognitive and social development. In turn, the impact on the child has profound implications for their family and community. The deterioration of public education, urban violence and the alarming social disintegration seen in some of our communities can be linked to the escalating cycles of abuse and neglect of our children. For most children a traumatic event is a new experience. Like all new experiences, the unknown adds to the confusing and frightening circumstances surrounding the experience. The trauma may significantly challenge the child's sense of the world. A flood, tornado, car accident, shooting, death of a friend, classmate or family member or abuse by a caregiver - all challenge the child's beliefs about the stability and safety of his/her world. Children may not understand what happened and will be confused or even frightened by the reactions of their siblings or caregivers.

The post-traumatic period is characterized by an attempt by the child to reorganize, reevaluate and restore the pre-traumatic world. Many of the emotional, behavioral and cognitive signs and symptoms of the posttraumatic period are due to these efforts. Children often do not have the capacity to understand or explain most traumatic experiences. Children seek answers and comfort from adults around them, yet adults often feel helpless in this role. While adults do not have all the answers, they can help children better understand a traumatic event and the ways we respond following trauma. This course addresses some of the key issues related to the child's complex set of reactions that often follow traumatic events. The more we understand the impact of traumatic experiences, the more compassionate and wise we can be as we try to help these children.

This course is applicable to all teachers in all grade levels.

# ED 5990 G892 The HIV & AIDS of Today - It's Still Here in our Communities

Since 1990 there is approximately 50,000 NEW cases of HIV every year. Why are there so many new cases each year for a completely preventable disease? Teachers at every grade level will be able to apply the knowledge learned here to better execute the New York state mandated lessons for each grade level. When educators have a better understanding of course curricula, they in turn will feel more comfortable teaching the content which not only helps the teacher but the students will prosper too. Teacher s will be able to identify the fluids that transmit HIV, be able to distinguish between high, low and virtually no risk behaviors, have an understanding of Prep and Pep, Additionally teachers will utilize refusal skills, decision making skills through various role-plays and discussions among colleagues.

# Improving Classroom Instruction and Assessment by Implementing Gardner's Theory of Interpersonal Intelligence

Writing is the most complex task we ask students to do throughout school. This course will present an overview of research and theories that relate to the teaching of writing. This course is designed to provide educators with the information necessary to teach all students, Grades Kadult, a process for organizing and expressing thoughts, feelings, and ideas in written language.

They will learn that handwriting, spelling, knowledge of sentence structure, knowledge of sentence combining and executive functioning skills all play an important role in the ability to write effectively.
